Somaliland needs to make a clear statement that it will not engage in any more talks with Somalia until Somaliland's independence is recognized.

Repeated Betrayals and Failed Conversations:

Repeated Betravals and Failed Conversations Somaliland and Somalia have engaged in many rounds of negotiation since 2012. These conversations never touched on the core issue of Somaliland's sovereignty, instead concentrating on pragmatic issues like airspace management. Somalia's insincerity in recognizing Somaliland's independence became evident when negotiations collapsed in 2015. Further discussions are pointless because Mogadishu has continuously rejected any suggestions that recognize Somaliland as a distinct entity since that time. Prolonged, fruitless negotiations simply serve to postpone Somaliland's justifiable bid for international recognition.

Somalia's Ongoing Hostility Towards Somaliland:

In addition to showing a lack of goodwill, Somalia's actions over the years have deliberately threatened Somaliland's sovereignty:

Political and Military Interference: Increased tensions and military battles in Lasanood and Sool have resulted from Somalia's persistent meddling in Somaliland's domestic affairs, including illegal visits to Somaliland areas.

Economic Obstruction:

The Berbera Port development agreement with DP World and Ethiopia has been fiercely resisted The Economic Development and Functional Statehood of Somaliland:

Somaliland has established a viable state with democratic institutions and economic resilience, in contrast to Somalia, which remains plagued by violence and political instability:

Democratic Governance:

Compared to Somalia, Somaliland has excelled in preserving democratic values through free and fair elections.

Economic Development:

Steady economic growth has been driven by the private sector, primarily through livestock exports and the strategically important Berbera Port. Somaliland's position as a major regional economic force is further cemented by recent trade deals with Ethiopia and DP World.

International Engagement:

Somaliland has built direct ties with international partners, eschewing Mogadishu's influence, while not yet receiving official recognition. Somaliland's future is better served by fortifying these connections than by pursuing pointless talks with Somalia.

The Dangers of Ongoing Conversation:

Instead of wasting time on futile negotiations, Somaliland should focus on:

1% Increasing diplomatic efforts to obtain bilateral recognition from important regional and international actors.

Î% Strengthening trade agreements and infrastructural initiatives that support Somaliland's selfsufficiency to increase economic independence.

Ï% Strengthening military and security measures to shield Somaliland's territorial integrity from outside threats.

Somaliland has made too much progress to be drawn into yet another round of unproductive negotiations and empty promises. Without acknowledgment, dialogue is pointless. It's time to make a moral decision: unless Somalia recognizes the independence of Somaliland, there should be no further talks. Somaliland must express its legitimate position in the international world without being constrained by fruitless talks with Mogadishu. To ensure its future as a fully acknowledged, independent country, Somaliland must forge its own path. ## Why Somaliland's Independence Deserves Recognition



Somaliland's independence is long overdue

In the Horn of Africa—long synonymous with instability—one region has defied expectations. Somaliland, a self-governing state since 1991, remains unrecognized by the international community. This is not an accident. It is an injustice. The world continues to allow Somalia, a nation that committed genocide against Somalilanders, to represent them on the global stage. Worse still, Somaliland is penalized for its success while its former oppressor enjoys diplomatic legitimacy.

It is time to correct this historical wrong. It is time to recognize Somaliland's independence.

## A Nation That Survived Genocide

Between 1987 and 1989, the Siad Barre regime waged a brutal campaign against the people of Somaliland, particularly in the capital, Hargeisa. According to reports by Africa Watch and Human Rights Watch, more than 50,000 people were killed. Some estimates place the death toll at over 100,000. Somali government The orchestrated aerial bombardments, mass executions, and systematic persecution in an attempt to annihilate the Isaag clan-the backbone of Somaliland society. This was not mere repression; it was genocide.

And yet, today, Somalia still claims sovereignty over Somaliland. By refusing to recognize Somaliland's independence, the international community forces its people to accept representation by a state that once sought to destroy them. Would the world have accepted Nazi Germany speaking for Poland after World War II? Would Rwanda have been asked to let génocidaires represent them? The status quo is a moral absurdity. Why Should Somalia Represent Somalilanders? Somalia ranks among the most fragile states on earth, topping the 2024 Fragile States Index. For more than three decades, it has been plagued by civil war, insurgency,

piracy, and political dysfunction. Somaliland, by contrast, has built a functioning democracy with regular elections, a stable government, and no significant internal conflict.

Yet at the United Nations, the African Union, and other global forums, Somalia is allowed to speak on behalf of Somalilanders. If the people of Somaliland overwhelmingly reject Somali rule, why should Mogadishu be allowed to claim them?

Somaliland has repeatedly demonstrated its commitment to independence. In a 2001 referendum, 97% of voters supported sovereignty, a result validated by independent observers. If democracy means anything, their voices should matter.

#### Self-Determination is a Fundamental Right

The right to self-determination is enshrined in international law. The United Nations Charter explicitly recognizes the right of people to determine their political status.

Somaliland, which voluntarily united with Somalia in 1960 before breaking away in the wake of genocide, has every legal and moral right to govern itself. Opponents argue that recognizing Somaliland would encourage a wave of separatism across Africa. This fear-based reasoning ignores two key facts: Somaliland is not a newly formed state. It was a British protectorate that gained independence in 1960 before mistakenly choosing to unite with Somalia. Also, recognizing Somaliland would not set a dangerous precedent-it would affirm the right of a historically distinct, democratically governed state to self-rule. To withhold recognition from Somaliland is to punish success. If stability, democracy, and economic progress disqualify a nation from independence, what incentive remains for good governance? The Cost of Delay

is self-sufficient, democratically governed, and home to the emerging port city of Berbera—a vital regional trading hub.

And it has achieved all of this without international recognition. Imagine what could be accomplished with full diplomatic legitimacy and access to global financial institutions.

But the longer recognition is delayed, the steeper the cost. Without official status, Somaliland is excluded from international development funding, trade agreements, and security partnerships. Its potential is stifled not by internal failures but by the global community's reluctance to act.

## Why is the World Ignoring Somaliland?

Many nations fear that recognizing Somaliland would provoke Somalia or disrupt Africa's colonial-era borders. But fear is a poor justification for injustice.

Once, European powers claimed that granting independence to African nations would lead to chaos. That argument, too, was rooted in self-interest rather than principle. Today, the refusal to recognize Somaliland follows the same flawed logic.

If the world values democracy, stability, and justice, it must Somaliland's acknowledge sovereignty. Otherwise, it rewards a failed state—Somalia—while punishing Somaliland for its remarkable success. The time to recognize Somaliland is now. 4. Preparedness for Disasters and Drought Relief



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#### Transport Minister decries rise of traffic accidents, emphasizes road connections to frontier towns

The Minister of Transport for Road Development in Somaliland, Hon. Osman Ibrahim Nur Af-gaab, has underscored the importance his government places on the road connection between Somaliland and neighboring countries.

He lamented on the statistics of the traffic case that has gone out of hand and the need to put them in check.

The minister has also disclosed that the government vehicle registration exercises were nearing completion.

Government vehicles had hitherto no log-books and their introduction and agency attached to would go down well in having government inventory in check. The transport minister gave the sentiments during an exclusive interview he had with Dawan newspapers reporter Feysal Hiis Afgaab.

Minister Osman-Afgaab decried that the level of road accidents have skyrocketed and that it ought to be put in check forthwith. He said that in January this year alone over 600 cases were reported.

He said, "As the traffic law enforcement forces reported, there were 620 accidents in January, resulting in deaths, injuries and property damage. This shows that there were about 20 accidents per day". He continued, "This is a shocking fact that needs to be addressed. We are making efforts to control this issue. In the past, vehicles, roads and drivers were blamed for the accidents, but now 90% of them are attributed to the drivers, vehicles that were incongruous with the road lanes specifications (thus left vs. right-<sup>I</sup>handed ones) and the unserviced vehicles plying the roads."

He pointed out that the stopping of importation of incongruous road-stipulation vehicles alone was not the only resolution but that the regulations of issuance of licenses has to be tightened. He observed that the national driving licenses regulating systems do not ban repeated offenders from driving. He attributed to such repetitive deathcausing drivers as tantamount to being slayers and butchers hence ought to be stopped.

He revealed that amendments of the laws are in the offing.

He also said that rising awareness on the matter of the increasing number of traffic accidents is to be initiated.

He pointed out that good infrastructure was the back-bone of the national coffers hence it was imperative that road connections to the national frontiers, between the regions and also inter districts ought to be put in place.

He said that coastal towns in Sanaag have to be well connected just as those in Sahil district in the hinterland; so too, should the roads that connect to

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Ethiopia and Djibouti be built. The minister said that following the initiatives, the government is currently embarking on the Hargeisa-Balligubdle road and also the Baki-Borame one. On the other hand the minister praised the president's successive trips to the United Arab Emirates and the achievements he made there. He said. "The President's trip was a valuable one, that testify to where Somaliland is heading", guipping that it was triumphant to both the President and the nation of Somaliland.

## Somaliland police arrest foreigners for repackaging expired medicine

Following an operation monitoring fraudulent drug dealers, the Somaliland police have arrested four Yemeni nationals accused of repackaging expired medicine with falsified expiry dates in a bid to resell the drugs in local markets, authorities said on Monday.

The men were detained during a raid in Hargeisa; according to police they were found repacking expired pharmaceuticals into cartons imported from China.

Officials say the suspects had erased original expiry labels and replaced them with fraudulent dates, raising serious public health concerns.

"We caught these individuals in the act of rebranding expired medicine deceive to consumers," said Col. Ahmed Saeed, Hargeisa's eastern regional police commander. "This is a dangerous practice that could have harmed countless people." Authorities said the investigation began when they learned that empty medicine cartons had arrived at Hargeisa's airport two days before the raid. The boxes, which are said to have been brought from abroad, had preprinted expiration labels designed to mislead consumers into believing the drugs were new.

Libaah. "They were intended to repackage expired drugs collected from local pharmacies and put back on the market as if they were fresh."

Police seized five cartons of the expired drugs, along with computers and fake certificates allegedly used in the scheme.

The governor of the Maroodi-Jeeh region Mr. Ahmed Mohamed Adad, said that the men had invested approximately \$9,000 in the counterfeit operation.

"They planned to buy expired drugs from pharmacies, erase the dates, and repackage them into these imported cartons before selling them as if they were safe for consumption," Adad said.

"This is fraud and a serious public health hazard," he posed. Authorities have warned that substandard and counterfeit medicines have increasingly found their way into Somaliland's markets, with officials struggling to regulate the quality of pharmaceuticals entering the country.

All Bids must be accompanied by a "Bid-Securing Declaration".

"We had been monitoring these cartons," said Osman Adan, district commissioner of Ga'an The four suspects remain in custody and will be presented in court once the investigations are complete, police said.

Somaliland and the wider region have, in recent times, faced growing concerns over the influx of unregulated medicine, with some drugs linked to adverse health effects. The government has vowed to crack down on counterfeit pharmaceuticals.
